Jarrah House - Research Initiatives

Jarrah House in Little Bay provides a ten-week residential drug and alcohol treatment program for women with substance use issues, with or without children. Aboriginal women are prioritised into treatment and account for approximately 25% of bed occupancy. A medicated detoxification service is initially provided for both women and infants with Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome. This is followed by an evidenced-based, trauma-informed treatment program integrating 1) dialectical behaviour therapy (DBT), 2) a domestic violence program, 3) a circle of security-based parenting group intervention 4) neurocognitive remediation training 5) yoga, poetry and relaxation sessions and 6) various medical assessments and treatment clinics (dental, optometry, audiology, speech pathology, hepatitis C screening, antenatal and postnatal check-ups).

The Jarrah House team are currently in the process of reviewing and strengthening their capacity to deliver high quality clinical standards of care across their evidenced-based drug and alcohol treatment program. In conjunction with this, they have hired a Research Psychologist to facilitate in-house evaluations of the various program components, and to collaborate with academics from Universities in the undertaking of new research studies. Experiences of Functional Neurological Disorder

This report summarises the findings of a research project on the experiences of people diagnosed with Functional Neurological Disorder (FND) and their carers in Australia. The research was undertaken by FND Australia Support Services Inc for the National Mental Health Commission.

People with FND experience a variety of disabling motor, sensory and cognitive neurological symptoms, and often face significant challenges in accessing the treatment and support they need. They also confront high levels of stigma and discrimination by both clinicians and people in the community. This report aims to highlight areas that are in need of improvement to enhance the quality of life experienced by people living with and affected by FND.

Suicide Attempts: How Does the Acute Use of Alcohol Affect Suicide Intent? Suicide & life-threatening behavior

Salles, Tiret, Gallini, Gandia, Arbus, Mathur, Bougon (2019)

Abstract: Very few studies have specifically addressed the role of the acute use of alcohol (AUA) in suicide attempts. Our study compared the suicide intent scores of self-poisoning patients with and without AUA in order to examine the role of alcohol in attempted suicides. We recruited 516 patients admitted to the emergency department for self-poisoning. We screened blood alcohol concentrations (BACs) to determine whether these were positive or negative in the two groups. We collected data about covariates such as psychiatric disorders and sociodemographic and suicide characteristics. We then compared suicide intent between the groups, adjusted according to the covariates. The patients with AUA had lower scores for suicide intent, but this factor only reduced the self-reporting score, with the scores for objective circumstances and risk similar between the groups. There was a correlation between BACs and self-reported suicide intentionality, but this was not significant. Acute use of alcohol patients presented with lower suicide intent, as particularly explained by the self-report

scores, but there were no differences between the groups in terms of risk and/or the objective circumstances. The role of alcohol in the self-reporting of suicide attempts must be addressed in future studies. © 2019 The American Association of Suicidology.

Avoidable waste in the production and report of research evidence

Chalmers and Glasziou 2009 ([link](#))

An efficient system of research should address health problems of importance to populations and the interventions and outcomes considered important by patients and clinicians. However, public funding of research is correlated only modestly with disease burden, if at all. Within specific health problems there is little research on the extent to which questions addressed by researchers match questions of relevance to patients and clinicians. In an analysis of 334 studies, only nine compared researchers' priorities with those of patients or clinicians. The findings of these studies have revealed some dramatic mismatches...

Making research relevant: If it is an evidence-based practice, where's the practice evidence?

Green 2008

The usual search for explanations and solutions for the research-practice gap tends to analyze ways to communicate evidence-based practice guidelines to practitioners more efficiently and effectively from the end of a scientific pipeline. This examination of the pipeline looks upstream for ways in which the research itself is rendered increasingly irrelevant to the circumstances of practice by the process of vetting the research before it can qualify for inclusion in systematic reviews and the practice guidelines derived from them. It suggests a 'fallacy of the pipeline' implicit in one-way conceptualizations of translation, dissemination and delivery of research to practitioners. Secondly, it identifies a 'fallacy of the empty vessel' implicit in the assumptions underlying common characterizations of the practitioner as a recipient of evidence-based guidelines. Remedies are proposed that put emphasis on participatory approaches and more practice-based production of the research and more attention to external validity in the peer review, funding, publication and systematic reviews of research in producing evidence-based guidelines.
